A Message from Rabbi Fasman

In August of 2001, my first week at Shaare Zedek, there was an article in the Jewish Light regarding an “incident” at a local orthodox congregation in which their long-time baal koreh (Torah reader) had been let go apparently because (among other things), he was willing to permit his daughter to enter rabbinical school. Many of you may know that this young rabbinical student is **Eliana Yolkut**. I met her at morning minyan my first week here. Barukh HaShem, the extraordinary Yolkuts have been happily (re)affiliated with Shaare Zedek for these past five years. And on Monday evening, May 22, I will be present along with her family at Sinai Temple in Los Angeles as Eliana is ordained “rabbi, teacher, and sage in Israel” by the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies at the University of Judaism.

Every Friday evening, at our Shabbat table, I sing Eishet Chayil [Proverbs 31:10-31] to Alice. One of my favorite lines is Piha pot’cha b’khochmah, v’torah chesed al l’shonah – “She opens her mouth with wisdom, and the Torah of lovingkindness is on her tongue.” In the Talmud [Sukkah 49b], Rabbi Elazar asks, “What is the intent of this verse? Is there one Torah of lovingkindness and another which is not of lovingkindness?” He answers himself: “Torah studied for its own merit is a Torah of lovingkindness, whereas Torah studied for an ulterior motive is not. And some say that Torah studied in order to teach is a Torah of lovingkindness, whereas Torah not studied in order to teach is not a Torah of lovingkindness.” Thus, the essence of Torah is lovingkindness – when we study for the right reasons. Our Sages want us to understand that Torah is meant to be shared, not used. It is meant to be taught – that is, given to others through words and deeds, not jealously guarded.

This is, after all, the cornerstone of what it means to be a Conservative Jew – constantly engaging seriously with our tradition...in order to enrich and deepen our relationships with others: with children and grandchildren (what Torah of lovingkindness do you have to teach them?), with spouses, with friends, with our community, with business associates, and with complete strangers.

Rabbi Yolkut takes her place in a sacred tradition as teacher and sage in Israel. Beginning this summer, she will serve congregation Adat Ari El, in the San Fernando Valley. She will teach, she will share, and she will immerse herself in the needs of this Jewish community. For Eliana, and for all who have made a commitment to dedicating their lives to serving the Jewish people – as rabbis, as cantors, as teachers, as Jewish professionals of all kinds – we need to acknowledge and thank them. As one who has been through this transformation, I can tell you that there is no greater acknowledgement or thanks than willingness (and even eagerness) to learn from each of these committed men and women. Each has a Torah of lovingkindness to teach, and they will only find their professional lives meaningful if there are students with whom to share this Torah.

Of course, you don’t have to become a Jewish professional to participate in the grand enterprise of lifelong Jewish learning. The psalmist writes [Psalms 90:10]: Y’mei sh’noteinu va-hem shiv’im shanah – “The span of our life is seventy years ...” Thus, there is a custom to begin counting one’s age from the beginning once you reach seventy. So at eighty-three, one does what every thirteen-year-old Jewish boy does: Bar Mitzvah! On May 6, we will have the opportunity to attend a very special Bar Mitzvah of a young man who does not remember anything about the first one. **Joseph Iken**, the son of Ben (z”l) and Celia (z”l) Iken, will be called to the Torah as a Bar Mitzvah. Joe has learned the haftarah and he has prepared a Dvar Torah. Join us as Joe becomes a man ... again. This is part of what it means to be a man, to be a mensch: to engage in Jewish learning and to be a teacher of Torah (by words and by actions). Torah is not just kid’s stuff. In fact, it’s not kid’s stuff at all. And this second Bar Mitzvah celebration is a joyous reminder that you are never too old to increase Torah in your life.

Speaking of re-living the Bar Mitzvah experience, on May 20, **Eddie Schukar**, the son of Hyman (z”l) and Nancy Schukar, will commemorate five decades of being Bar Mitzvah. (After all, one does not have a Bar Mitzvah; one is Bar Mitzvah.) Eddie now lives in Houston, but his heart (and that morning, his vocal cords) are at Shaare Zedek. He has been learning his haftarah and his maftir, and he reports that Torah learning is both harder and more meaningful than it was fifty years ago. Like Joe Iken, Eddie is also unwilling to rest on the laurels of early adolescent accomplishment. He has challenged himself to continually re-engage with Torah and to teach it (through word and deed).

Finally, on that same weekend, we will be honoring our Shaare Shalom upper-class students. Three sophomores – **Amy Glick, Shayna Feldman, and Rachyl Cooke** – will be confirmed in a ceremony on Sunday, May 21. And **Adam Levy, Stephanie Levy, and John Singer** have the special distinction of being in the first graduating class of Shaare Shalom. These three trailblazers (supported, and perhaps occasionally dragged by their parents) have continued their formal Jewish studies not only through 10th grade, but through 12th grade. Part of the core of their learning these past two years has been to learn to teach (through mentoring and by assisting in classrooms). Thus they are the very embodiment of what we strive for as a core value in our Conservative Movement: torat chesed – a Torah of lovingkindness, learned for its own sake (it probably won’t get them into better colleges!) and also learned in order to teach.

Mazal tov to all of our graduates this season, and to their families as well. We add a special yashar kochekhem to our newest teachers of Torah: **Rabbi Eliana Yolkut, Joseph Iken, Eddie Schukar, Amy Glick, Shayna Feldman, Rachyl Cooke, Adam Levy, Stephanie Levy, and John Singer**. To paraphrase the end of Eishet Chayil: T’nu lahem p’ri yedeihem, vi-y’halleluhem va-she’arim ma’aseihem – “Extol them for the fruit of their hands, and let their works praise them in the gates.”

President's Message

May is a month filled with holidays, all of which focus our attention on Israel. Beginning on May 4, we remember the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for the State of Israel on Yom HaZikaron, Israeli Memorial Day. Then the very next day we celebrate Israeli Independence on May 5, Yom HaAtzmaut. Lag B'Omer, the 33rd day of the Omer, was not only noted in ancient Israel, but has become a favorite here at Shaare Zedek with a traditional bonfire and dancing. The month wraps up on May 26 with Yom Yerushalayim, commemorating the reunification of the city of Jerusalem.

Israel is central, not only in our prayers and holiday observances, but in many of the activities that take place here at Shaare Zedek. We have been fortunate to have active Israeli committees and programming with movies, current information concerning Israeli practices and governmental policies, and lecturers. Many of our members voted in the latest Mercaz elections, directly impacting Conservative Judaism's role in Israeli politics. As members of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, our Fuchsberg Center and Conservative Yeshiva are growing in sophistication and influence from their location in central Jerusalem.

Learning about the land of Israel is an integral part of the education our children receive in the curriculum of afternoon Hebrew school and Sunday Religious School. Israel lives every day in the halls of Solomon Schechter Day School as students learn Modern Hebrew in a bilingual environment and visit Israel as a part of their final 8th grade year. Those who choose Camp Ramah continue their Hebrew education over the summer, complete with counselors and teachers from Israel as well as Broadway musicals performed completely in Hebrew.

We are proud of the connections Shaare Zedek has with Israel, and we hope they continue to grow. This year, I am pleased to announce that our congregation has several of its young members traveling to Israel – **Jenny Levy** and **Allison Shenker** will be participating in USY Poland-Israel Pilgrimage while **Stephanie Levy** and **Ben Goldstein** will be attending USY Spain-Israel Pilgrimage. We wish them safe journeys and are proud of their commitment to our historical home.

Dear Quite,

What a great question you raise! While it is true that the synagogue tries very hard to be a welcoming, enjoyable place to congregants of all ages, proper behavior is expected, and certain parts of the shul are off-limits. During Shabbat (unless otherwise instructed) playing on the ECC playground or in the Mirowitz Auditorium is not allowed. The equipment in both of these areas is very expensive and is specifically designed for very young children. Even with parental supervision, it's very easy to damage these items. Also, young whipper-snappers shouldn't be wandering the halls unsupervised. There are plenty of activities to keep kids of all ages occupied (see page 10 for complete listings). Depending on the age and behavior of your children, your presence may or may not be requested.

I would like to build upon the D’var Torah given in March at Men’s Club Shabbat by **Dr. Burton Fischman** and include comments by **D. Singer**, FJMC officer, from this month’s FJMC Ha’Shofar.

In parshat Yitro, Moses’ father-in-law sees that Moses is overworked and advises him to delegate some responsibility. The sharing of responsibility in the Jewish community builds relationships and develops leadership. A recent study of Men’s Clubs learned that 77% of members are involved because they want to socialize with other men, 50% want to feel connected with the Jewish community, and 46% want to make a new friend or two. These results emphasize where Shaare Zedek’s Men’s Club has been focusing its efforts this past year. Imagine for a moment that a Men’s Club breakfast could be run by a single efficient person. What would be accomplished by the event? People would come to the event, have a nice meal, talk to their friends and go home. These are important accomplishments, but all ephemeral. They don’t have a lasting effect.

Our philosophy at the Shaare Zedek Men’s Club has been to involve as many people as possible. By involving many people in the planning of the event what would be accomplished? The attendees would still have a nice meal with their friends, but in addition to that all the various workers would have many opportunities though the planning effort to socialize through phone calls and meetings. People will learn that they can rely on each other and trust each other.

What is accomplished has little to do with the final event. The process of planning the event is where many of the accomplishments occur. In this parsha, Moses appoints Bazazel to lead the construction of the mishkan. Whether the task is building a mishkan or cutting bagels, these opportunities help accomplish our goals of developing the relationships between club members. One of our goals for the year is to follow the example set by Yitro and delegate, delegate, delegate; reaping the benefits of the seeds sown through the process of delegation, we find the sum of the parts will be greater than the whole!

Everyone should have received their Yom HaShoah candle. Please remember to mail your contribution to the Men’s Club Yom HaShoah campaign which supports causes such as the St. Louis Holocaust Museum and Learning Center, Men’s Club projects, and USY Scholarships to Israel and Eastern Europe.

In conclusion, I would like to delegate the responsibility to each member of Men’s Club to congratulate **Joe Iken** on the 70th Anniversary of his becoming Bar Mitzvah!

PAUL SCHANKMAN WINS PRESTIGIOUS WRITING AWARD

Local television newsman **Paul Schankman** recently received the regional Edward R. Murrow Award for writing, given by the Radio-Television News Directors Association. The Award is considered one of the most prestigious in broadcast news.



Schankman's winning entry was a composite of several stories including a behind-the-scenes look at searching for stray dogs in dangerous neighborhoods, an employee-led rebirth of a local steel company, and a feature about the last days in business of the city's last bowling alley.

Schankman, who is currently special projects reporter and Sunday morning news anchor, joined the staff of FOX 2 in 1983. According to Paul, "It was a homecoming. I grew up in St. Louis and always wanted to work for a television station in my hometown." A graduate of Parkway Central High School and Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, Paul is the son of **Lorraine** and the late **Raymond Schankman**, long-time members of Shaare Zedek Synagogue.

Schankman has covered a wide variety of events, including the Oklahoma City bombing, national political conventions, and a space shuttle launch. He was also the first St. Louis television reporter on the scene in New York the day after the 9-11 attack.

For his work, he has received 16 Emmys, a reporting award from the Greater St. Louis Association of Black Journalists, and several national awards, including Lincoln University's Unity Award, Dartmouth College's Champion-Tuck Award for Economics Reporting, and a bronze medal from the International Radio and Television Festival in New York. He is also a voting member of the St. Louis Walk of Fame Committee.

As the regional winner, Schankman's entry will now be judged at the national level.

I am delighted to announce that Professor Arnold M. Eisen has been elected to serve as the seventh Chancellor of The Jewish Theological Seminary.

He is an extraordinary individual and, I believe, uniquely qualified to lead JTS at this important time in the history of Conservative Judaism and the American Jewish community.

Prof. Eisen is Chair of the Department of Religious Studies and Koshland Professor of Jewish Culture and Religion at Stanford University. He is one of the worlds foremost experts in American Judaism. For the past twenty years, he has worked closely with synagogue and federation leadership around the country in analyzing and addressing the challenging issues of Jewish identity, the revitalization of Jewish tradition and the redefinition of the American Jewish community.

He is a strong advocate of JTS as the premier center of scholarship in the Jewish world and hopes to bring that scholarship to bear on the pressing issues of the day. He is also passionate about making Israel a greater part of American Jewish life.

He received a PhD in the History of Jewish Thought from The Hebrew University of Jerusalem; a BPhil in the Sociology of Religion at Oxford University; and a BA in Religious Thought from the University of Pennsylvania. His many publications include a personal essay, *Taking Hold of Torah: Jewish Commitment and Community in America* (1997), *Rethinking Modern Judaism: Ritual, Commandment, Community* (1998), and *The Jew Within: Self, Family and Community in America* (2000), co-authored with sociologist Steven M. Cohen (2000). Previous positions include Senior Lecturer in the Department of Jewish Philosophy at Tel Aviv University, and Assistant Professor in the Department of Religion at Columbia University.

He will serve as Chancellor-Designate effective July 1. As he fulfills his commitments to Stanford during the coming year of transition, he will engage with JTS students, faculty, staff and donors to fully understand our opportunities and challenges.

There is no doubt that the days and years ahead will be exciting, demanding and inspiring. I am confident that Prof. Eisen is the right person at the right time. His vision and energetic leadership will help to assure the vibrancy of JTS, the Conservative Movement and the Jewish people.

I look forward to your having the opportunity to meet him. In the mean time, my best to you and your loved ones.

Make vegetarian chili just like at shul

As per your request, here's the recipe for Vegetarian Chili. Enjoy!

Ingredients:

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 rib celery, sliced thinly
- 1 pkg sliced mushrooms (8 oz)
- 1 tsp minced garlic
- 1 Tbsp chili powder
- 1 can chili beans undrained (22 oz)
- 1 can black beans, drained and rinsed (16 oz)
- 3 cans diced tomatoes (14-16 oz each)
- 1/8 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp dried oregano
- 2 cups vegetarian crumbles (such as Morningstar)

Directions:

Coat soup pot with cooking spray. Heat over medium heat. Saute onions. Add celery, saute for 2 minutes. Add mushrooms and cook until they release their liquid, stirring frequently. Stir in garlic. Sprinkle with chili powder. Stir. Add beans, tomatoes, cinnamon and oregano. Bring to a boil. Stir in veggie crumbles. Return to boil, then simmer uncovered for 30 minutes or until flavors blend. Top with shredded cheese, sour cream, chips or anything you like.
